


All About





There were 12,964 cases of rape reported to the Philippine National Police between the years 2016 - 2021.*

On the average, about 2,000 cases were reported per year. The lowest number of reported cases was in the year 2016 with 2,084

cases, while the highest was in the year 2017 with 2,604 cases.

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The Anti-Rape Law as Amended Republic Act Nos. 8353 and 11648

Rape is a crime against a person who commits an act of sexual intercourse with the absence of explicit consent from the other person; or with a minor below sixteen (16) years of age.

Rape is committed:



By a person who shall have carnal knowledge of another person under any of the following circumstances:



Through force, threat, or intimidation

By means of fraudulent machination or grave abuse of authority

When the offended party is under sixteen (16) years of age or is demented^[1]



By any person who^[2] shall commit an act of sexual assault




By inserting his penis into another person's mouth or anal orifice, or any instrument or object, into the genital or anal orifice of another person




When the offended party is deprived of reason or otherwise unconscious


May be held liable for and be a victim of rape:



Any person, regardless of sex and employment status, who committed and experienced said circumstances



A husband who executes said circumstances to his own wife, also known as marital rape



Because rape is a grave offense under the Civil Service Commission rules, government employees who are proven guilty for said crime shall be subjected to dismissal, while criminal case penalties include:

Reclusion Temporal	When by reason or on the occasion of the rape, the victim has become insane	Twelve (12) to twenty (20) years
Reclusion Perpetua	Rape is committed through sexual intercourse	Twenty (20) to forty (40) years

Depending on the circumstances surrounding the crime, rape may also be subjected to death penalty.

[1] Eventhough said circumstances are present. Provided that there shall be no criminal liability on the part of a person having carnal knowledge of another person under sixteen (16) but not less than thirteen (13) years of age when the age difference between the parties is not more than three (3) years, and the sexual act occurred is consensual, non-abusive, and non-exploitative.

The complaint must be in writing, signed, and sworn by the complainant; and shall contain the following:





Provide your full name and address, and the respondent's full name, address, and position.

NARRATION OF FACTS

Tell us briefly what happened.

SUPPORTING DOCUMENTS

Provide us evidence, in support of the complainant, if any.

Anyone who has knowledge of the crime may file a case on the victim's behalf. The prosecution continues even if the victim drops the case or pardons the offender. Republic of the Philippines

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A 2021 study on sexual violence in the Philippines showed that aside from feeling of shame,

Filipino victims of rape developed fear for their

own lives and fear of being stigmatized; and experienced physical, psychological, and social effects.

Physically, they had difficulties in sleeping, lost of appetite, and a few unexpectedly got pregnant. Psychologically, they were depressed, hypervigilant, engaged in suicidal behavior, developed paranoia, experienced flashbacks, and projected negative emotions to others. Socially, they isolated themselves from their families and friends due to fear of being criticized, misjudged, and bullied, displayed unpleasant behaviors to others, including parents, and developed a sense of mistrust towards others.

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WHAT TO DO IF SOMEONE IS RAPED?

"Rape is an inherently violent crime that typically results in physical, social, emotional, and psychological harm. It remains a prevalent social problem in the Philippines, and throughout the world."






Advise the victim to seek the help of a counselor or a therapist who is an expert in handling cases of sexual abuse.



Support the victim along the way when the same decides to file a case.




Assist the victim in securing a safe and temporary shelter if moving to another place is needed for security reasons.

The victim may be referred to a crisis center or any government agency that offers temporary shelter.



Ensure that the victim is prepared in all aspects. Make the victim understand the overall picture of the case.

Inform the victim that it is possible that doctors, police, lawyers and judges would not be sensitive to the situation and experience.

Help choose the lawyer who understands the victim the most.



Secure a Medico-legal certificate from a Medico-legal officer.

Absence of bodily injuries does not mean that rape did not occur or that the case may not be pursued anymore.



Coordinate with people who can assist or support the victim all throughout.
