**Re: Posting Requirements for Lease of
Privately-Owned Real Estate and Venue**

Dear 

This refers to your letter seeking clarification on whether or not it is required to post the Request for Quotation (RFQ) for the lease of real estate and venue in the Philippine Government Electronic Procurement System (PhilGEPS).

The Guidelines for Lease of Privately-Owned Real Estate and Venue (Guidelines)¹, which provides the procedures and conditions for the procurement of contracts of lease of real property does not require the posting of the RFQ in the PhilGEPS or in any other website. It merely provides that "lease contracts with Approved Budget for the Contract (ABCs) costing more than Fifty Thousand Pesos (Php 50,000.00) shall be posted in the PhilGEPS".²

Moreover, Section 54.2 of the Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of Republic Act (RA) No. 9184 provides that for alternative methods of procurement, advertisement and posting as prescribed in Section 21.2.1 of this IRR may be dispensed with. The BAC is only mandated to post the invitation or request for submission of price quotations in the PhilGEPS website for Shopping under Sections 52.1(b); and, Negotiated Procurement under Sections 53.1 (two-failed biddings), 53.9 (small value procurement), and 53.11 (NGO Participation)³ of the IRR of RA 9184, the website of the procuring entity concerned, if available, and at any conspicuous place reserved for this purpose in the premises of the procuring entity for a period of seven (7) calendar days.⁴

In view of the foregoing, we wish to clarify that advertisement or posting of the RFQ for the lease of real property, such as a specific venue, is not required under the rules. It is the contract of lease costing more than P50,000.00 that is required to be posted in the PhilGEPS website, the website of the procuring entity concerned, if available, and at any conspicuous place reserved for this purpose in the premises of the procuring entity for a period of seven (7) calendar days.
